Reading First at Longwood and Hickory Bend

Hickory Bend and Longwood schools received a Reading First Grant in the spring of 2006 along with 19 other Illinois school districts. This grant is a state administered

program, part of the national No Child Left Behind Act. As recipients of this grant, we joined over 5000 schools across the country in focusing on early reading instruction. Reading First is a program that helps our schools deliver effective reading instruction so that all students read at or above grade level by the end of third grade. We believe that this program can make a difference with our students by dedicating more time to reading, providing more training to the teachers, and by targeting our instruction toward the skills and strategies students need the most.



In grades kindergarten through third grade, students are receiving 90 minutes of uninterrupted reading instruction every day. The Harcourt Trophies comprehensive reading program was adopted in the spring of 2005 and is the basis for the reading instruction during the 90 minutes. Teachers emphasize the


Andy Mink Crowned State Champion

FOR PARENTS

Get the whole family active. Plan times for everyone to get moving together. Take walks, ride bikes, go swimming, garden or just play hideand-seek outside.

Limit TV, video game and computer time. These habits lead to a sedentary lifestyle and excessive snacking, which increase risks for obesity and cardiovascular disease.

Encourage physical activities that children enjoy. Every child is unique. Let children experiment with different activities until each finds something

5. Be supportive. Focus on the positive instead of the negative. Everyone likes to be praised for a job well done. Celebrate successes and help children and teen develop a good self-image.

 Set specific goals and limits, such as one hour of physical activity a day or two desserts per week other than fruit. When goals are too abstract or limits too restrictive, the chance for success decreases.

Don't reward children with food. Candy and snacks as a reward encourage bad habits. Find other ways to celebrate good behavior.

8. Make dinnertime a family time. When everyone sits down together to eat, there's less chance of children eating the wrong foods or snacking too much. Get the kids involved in cooking and planning meals. Everyone develops good eating habits together and the quality time with the family will be an added bonus.

 Make a game of reading food labels. The whole family will learn what foods are healthy and be more conscious of daily food intake. It's a habit that helps change behavior for a lifetime.

10. Stay involved. Be an advocate for healthier children. Insist on good food choices at school. Make sure your children's health-care providers are monitoring cardiovascular indicators such as body-mass index, blood pressure, and cholesterol. Contact public officials on matters of the heart. Make your voice heard.

As you are probably aware, the Olympia High School and Olympia Middle School went into lockdown Wednesday (10/11) shortly before noon. The lockdown was called as a result of a threatening message on the stall wall in the boy's washroom. Olympia Administration notified law enforcement of the threat and shortly after notifying law enforcement, both McLean County Sheriff's and Illinois State Police arrived on the scene. Students remained in secure classrooms, as law enforcement swept the building for weapons during a two-hour period. As a result of the search, no weapons were found. At approximately 3:15 PM that day, law enforcement deemed the building safe and secure. Once the building was deemed safe. Olympia OHMS proceeded with regular dismissal procedures.

After dismissal, law enforcement and administration met with OHMS faculty and staff in the auditorium to discuss the events of the day. Sheriff Owens, Lt. Elston, and Superintendent Donald Hahn conducted a press conference shortly after 4:00 PM Wednesday afternoon. An investigation by the McLean County Sheriff's Department is underway. Faculty and staff met the following morning, October 12, to prepare for students.

Students, faculty, staff, administration and law enforcement are to be





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
